While many projects were completed within the last 12 months, Downtown Louisville began 2018 with \$1.78 billion in investment and 60 development projects announced or underway, all slated to be completed by the end of 2019. OUR LEGACY | FOUNDED 2013

Louisville Downtown Partnership was formed in 2013 and is comprised of two long-standing organizations.

The Louisville Downtown Management District (LDMD), Kentucky's first Business Improvement District (or BID), was established on August 27, 1991 to promote the economic, residential and cultural vitality of the core of Downtown. LDMD's mission has been to promote Downtown's quality of life by creating a safer, cleaner and more enjoyable environment by providing services that are designed to enhance the physical environment of the Downtown, including improvements for better security, maintenance, cleanliness, and marketing.

The Louisville Downtown Development Corporation (LDDC) is a private, non-profit 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to the long-term economic health of Downtown Louisville and represents the community's civic and business leadership. For the past 22 years, LDDC has played a crucial role in bringing together both the public and private sectors as partners in Downtown Louisville's redevelopment and long-term planning, with LDDC serving as the lead entity in the development and implementation of the Downtown Master Plan.

DOWNTOWN PLANNING INITIATIVES

We are experts at urban design, placemaking, community building, and core economic development. LDP works in tandem with Louisville Metro, Greater Louisville Inc., Waterfront Development Corporation, our Boards of Directors, Downtown stakeholders, developers, and investors to guide the development and subsequent execution of the Downtown Master Plan.

In 2017, LDP project managed the Whiskey Row infrastructure redevelopment and spearheaded streetscape plans for NuLu/East Market Street and South Fourth Street.

In collaboration with other Downtown partners, LDP planned and launched the Bourbon District, a unique walkable experience highlighting Downtown's rich bourbon heritage and the city's current bourbon tourism boom.

The South Fourth Street District Association was launched in 2017. The grassroots organization was established with volunteer committees using The Main Street Approach.

LDP also dynamically approached ways to effectively recruit and retain retailers to sustain the growth of South Fourth Street and adjoining areas.


LDP also contributed to a Downtown mobility study that was conducted to prioritize:



In addition to annual property taxes, Downtown property owners pay a special assessment on parcels located within the Business Improvement District (BID) to fund the Louisville Downtown Management District (LDMD). LDMD's mission is to promote Downtown's quality of life by creating a safer, cleaner, and more enjoyable environment. Services enhance the physical environment of Downtown which include improvements for better security, maintenance, cleanliness, and marketing.

For the last 12 years, LDP, along with many generous community partners, has funded the Downtown Beautification Program.

New trees, planted tree wells, flower pots, juniper bushes, and daffodil bulbs have added color and vibrancy to Downtown Louisville's public spaces.

DIGITAL KIOSKS

LDP will plan the installation of a digital kiosk pilot program, with plans to expand the kiosks to other Downtown districts, including: Medical District, Museum Row, Main Street, and Market Street.



SOUTH FOURTH STREET STREETSCAPE ENHANCEMENT

The 600 block streetscape project will realign South Fourth Street between Broadway and Chestnut Street. The design will add parking, improve the tree canopy, enhance lighting, and improve the overall pedestrian experience.





SOCCER STADIUM CONNECTIVITY

Recognizing the economic impact to Downtown, LDP will be partnering with Metro Government to investigate ways to connect the new soccer stadium to Downtown.



WASHINGTON STREET MASTER PLAN

To stimulate vibrancy, LDP will develop a master plan that will include pedestrian amenities, lighting changes, and other improvements to add to the commercial and tourism corridor between the KFC YUM! Center and Louisville Slugger Field.

LDP will implement a transformative street redesign that emphasizes pedestrian safety, neighborhood authenticity, transit options, and a new approach to bicycle infrastructure.


